A GLIMPSE OF HEAVEN

The most frequent Pilgrim response following Candlelight: *"It was like a glimpse of heaven."* So what is it about Candlelight that makes for such a moving experience? I'm sure many of you may answer differently but my guess would be something like this--a geographically dispersed community of very diverse people single-mindedly and single-heartedly dedicated to crystal clear vision – to embody Christ for the sake of others, to bear Christ's light, to be Christ's light. In these fleeting moments, the whole community gathers for one purpose: to nudge the Pilgrims ever closer to a more complete realization that they are truly beloved of an awesome God who wants something for them – a closer relationship with them, with all of us.

MISSION of Emmaus: Empowering leaders through Emmaus and Chrysalis to be the hands and feet of Christ

VISION of Emmaus: Fourth Day leaders embodying Christ

Participation in Candlelight is perhaps the clearest example of how each aspect of the Emmaus model connects the mission of Emmaus with the vision of Emmaus – encouraging and empowering new and future church leaders to embody Christ by embodying Christ.

As we consider the Emmaus weekend model as a whole, there is not a single aspect that doesn't bear this message. Take the "my new friend" exercise starting with Thursday night. It may be so easy to think of this as merely an "icebreaker", a simple exercise to get the ball rolling, but in reality it is so much more and reflects a deep comprehension of Christ and Christlikeness to which we all aspire.

Name, family situation, something unique about you.... The Emmaus weekend has to start somewhere, somehow and so it starts with **knowing** and **being known**. As we seek to embody Christ, how much more Christ-like does it get than to focus at the level of our personal identities. In our Christian circles we say God knows our names, God cares about our personal circumstances, God knows and cares about each of us deeply even to the point of numbering the hairs on our heads. We certainly can't match God in the caring department or the knowing department, but we can work at it. Think about it:

Jesus knows people by name.

Zacchaeus, come down from that tree, I'm coming to your place for dinner tonight.

There is perhaps nothing more relational than being known by name. To know and be known by name demonstrates the value with which Jesus Christ regarded the people to whom He ministered. Knowing one's name "embodies" Christ.

Jesus knows people's family situations. Consider the woman at the well. "The fact is you have had five husbands and the man you are with now is not your husband."

Maybe not the greatest opening relationship-building line, but the point is that Jesus knew people personally, at a level where he could speak to their inner spirit, their very soul. Again, I'm not saying we dig into that kind of depth at first meeting, but you do see what I mean. To know something about a person's family situation embodies Christ.

Jesus knows something unique about each of us. Jesus knew Matthew was a tax collector, invited himself to dinner, and then used that fact as a basis for a great little message: In Mt 9 Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners." Now we are not supposed to talk about occupations on the weekend at all so this may be a bad example. But the point is this. Jesus knew something about Matthew that was unique. That information led to another whole circumstance where Jesus' presence could be experienced and Jesus' message could be spoken. Beyond building relationship, you just never know where God might take things, how God might make connections based not on what you know, but who you know. Knowing something unique about someone embodies Christ!

Jesus, God's own son, sent from heaven to dwell among us to show us a new way to be. We celebrate that this Easter and all Easter's past, present and to come. Why? Certainly to save us! Yes! But for a purpose as well: to love and serve Him in mission, to reflect Himself, the embody Christ! My prayer for all of us is that we embrace the message of Easter and the call it places upon our very lives more than ever this year. Reach out, break the ice and get to know someone new, their name, their family situation or something unique about them. Know and be known this Easter!

FROM THE COMMUNITY SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR

Dear Emmaus family,

The journey we began on Ash Wednesday is coming to an end. We've celebrated with our church families on Palm Sunday at the beginning of Holy Week. Did you wave your palms in honor of the King? Did you sing hosanna to our King?

I am always amazed at how quickly the cries of "**Hosanna!**" change into cries of "**Crucify Him!**" Picturing Jesus on the cross is difficult to do. We don't like to think about Jesus suffering and dying for us. It's uncomfortable. It's difficult. It's heart-wrenching. Imagining Him willingly sacrificing Himself for us and our sins.

We want so much to stay in the joy and celebration of Palm Sunday that we are tempted to skip over Maundy Thursday and Good Friday so that we can arrive at Easter Sunday and the joy that accompanies such a celebration. But we cannot arrive at the resurrection without the cross.

I encourage you to attend services on Maundy Thursday wherever you worship to remember Jesus' last night on earth. When Jesus celebrated Passover with his disciples two very important things happened. First, he celebrated the Lord's Supper, which we still celebrate and remember. Second, Jesus washed the disciple's feet as an act of humility and service. "Maundy," which is Latin for *command*, refers to the command that we should love and serve one another. And serve you do! It is such a joy

Good Friday is the most solemn day of the Christian calendar. It is a time to grieve over our sins and also meditate and rejoice that God loves us so much God's son willingly went to the cross so that we might spend forever with HIM!!

Whenever I think of Jesus on the cross, the image that comes to mind is from Luke's gospel where Jesus is hanging on the cross between two others described as criminals.

One of them starts to taunt Jesus and hurls insults at him saying, "Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us!" But the other criminal reprimands him, "Don't you fear God, since you are under the same sentence? We are punished justly, for we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said to Jesus, "Remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus answered him, "I tell you the truth. Today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:39-43)

What a passage of hope and love! No matter what we do, what crimes we commit, what sins we cannot let go of, through Christ we are forgiven. He awaits us in paradise! And that is Good News indeed!

I pray that as you continue your Lenten journey into Holy Week and beyond, you are constantly reminded of God's gift of relentless grace, given freely to each and every one of us!

The Tale of the Talents

The Holy Bible has been referred to by phrases such as “the Good Book” as well as “Living Word”. I have discovered that the more I read “the Good Book” it usually coincides with what is going on in my life.

It happened recently again when the scripture concerning the Parable of the Talents was the basis for the Sunday sermon (Matthew 25:14-30). Pastor Kate asked for three volunteers who would be willing to take a risk. My husband and I, along with our pew neighbor Kathy, raised our hands and we each received an envelope with a different denomination of cash in each envelope. The only instructions we were given was to do something with the “seed money” and report back in four Sundays. The end of our time of “reaping what you sow” came faster than what four Sundays should. The three of us shared with the congregations how the experience was for each of us.

Kathy shared that the small amount of cash she had to work with (\$3.00) was discouraging, but opportunity presented itself to her. The church had a “family movie night”, so she sold popcorn to go with the free drinks that were offered. She then invested that in a ball of crochet thread, made cross bookmarks, and posted on her Facebook about the “Talent Challenge”. She received enough orders from the bookmarks to bring in even more cash. The popcorn sales and the bookmarks orders generated almost \$20.00. Her experience was highlighted by the fact that she had witnessed to her “Facebook friends”.

Rex invested his \$5.00 in a popular agape item he received last fall at the men’s walk. He was able to purchase back scratchers. He sold them, and bought more, and sold those as well, and continued that process until there were no more scratchers to buy. His total came to \$53.00. He also was able to witness why he was selling them.

My \$10.00 turned into five yards of discounted novelty fabric and a spool of, economically priced, thread. I used my “talent” to sew over two dozen versions of a children’s quiet toy, a cloth maze made with a big button sandwiched between two pieces of fabric. Straight lines are sewn so the button can be moved from one side of the sewn maze to the other side. There are twenty-seven little toddlers that hopefully will be entertained by this “quiet time” toy. I received orders from Christmas parties and my weekly sewing group. I kept repeating the Tale of the Talents to different people. My envelope in the offering plate had \$27.00 and a pledge of any more orders would be added to that amount. This experience had warmed my heart since I was participating in something that Jesus had spoken about. The parable of the talents became “Living Word” to me.

The three of us were able to “reap what we sow”, but sometimes you do have to “rip out what you sew”.


Endeavoring for Christ requires strength, courage, and support. Growth in Christ comes through prayer, worship, study and fellowship. How do we sustain this new life?
